
As attending students, you will be asked to actively participating in all this.

The Development economics and policies module

More about this module

My approach:

... *economic development* deals with evolution of people, society, social groups, economy, institutions, opportunities, capacities...

There is *no agreement* on theories of development. Economists and social scientists know very little on the subject... economic development is still one of the most crucial issues for world societies!

Thus, the aim of this part will be to stimulate your *critical thinking* about theories and real world experiences of development processes and policies

REMEMBER: Your active participation *is essential* (and will be part of the final evaluation), so feel free to raise your hand!

Main contents of the module

- **1**. Development: theories and basic concepts
- 2. Measuring development
- 3. Development, poverty and inequality
- 4. How does development come? Structural change, growth theories, policies and strategies
- 5. China: a special case

The Labs (1)

- **4 Laboratories** along the whole module
- They consist of presentations and discussions about selected papers
- They are an opportunity for you to:
 - Enhance your ability to read, understand and report a scientific work
 - Increase your capacity to organize your speeches
 - Raise your critical thinking
 - Increase your ability for public speaking
- You will be divided in groups, each paper will be presented by one group and discussed by another
- During the whole course, each group will study a total of 4 papers (2 to be presented and 2 to be discussed)

The Labs (2)

How to make the presentations:

- Please use a powerpoint presentation to present and discuss the papers.
- Beware of the timing: The paper presentations should last max 20 minutes (approx. 10 slides); the discussions should last max 10 minutes (overruning will influence your mark!)
- Presentations: <u>all the components</u> of the group are required to speak
 Discussions: <u>at least two components</u> of the group are required to speak, with rotations

The Labs (3)

Tasks of the group *presenting* the paper:

- synthesise and tell to the rest of the class: the main **topic** of the paper, some notes about the **author**(**s**), the general (theoretical) **framework** of reference, the **thesis** proposed, the main **arguments**, the **methodology**, the **main findings**, **your general view** of the paper etc.;

Tasks of the group *discussing* the paper:

- discuss the paper by emphasising: major value of the paper (originality, clearness, rigour etc.), limitations, contribution to the literature, relevance of the topic analysed, usefulness to understand different cases etc.

Other groups are encouraged to **intervene** in the general discussion with **reflections** on the topics of the paper, **links** to the frontal lectures and to the paper they are discussing/presenting

The Labs (4)

- The papers selected for the laboratories will be available for you at least 6 days before the laboratory
- All suggested readings and materials will be available on the <u>TEACHING</u> <u>MATERIALS</u> section of the Website of the course.
- FIRST LABORATORY is on FRI 11th OCT the papers will be available by FRI 4th OCT

The Labs (5)

Next step is defining the groups!:

- If you have decided to attend the course, by the end of tomorrow's class leave your name, surname and email address on the sheet
