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General information

Established in 1911, UWA is Western Australia's oldest university and one of Australia's most prestigious educational institutions.

First-time visitors to the campus will find UWA's impressive architecture and beautifully landscaped gardens breath-

taking. UWA's riverside campus, only minutes from the city centre offers an unrivalled study experience. Students have access to libraries, an extensive range of campus services, and excellent sports and recreational facilities to balance the demands of study. Activities include sports such as tennis, squash, basketball, volleyball and aerobics, general interest clubs and societies, cafes, theatres and museums.

The University of Western Australia (UWA) is recognised internationally as a leading university and in 2012 ranked 96th in the Academic Ranking of World Universities (ARWU) from the Shanghai Jiao Tong University. UWA is the only Western Australian university to belong to the prestigious <u>Group of Eight</u> – a coalition of the top research universities in Australia – and is one of only two Australian universities to belong to the <u>Worldwide Universities</u> <u>Network</u>, a partnership of 18 research-led universities from Europe, North America, North Asia and Australia.

UWA's formal agreements with nearly 230 institutions (including over 130 Student Exchange Agreements) around the world, provide a spirit of internationalism and promote a lively exchange of staff, students, knowledge and ideas. International exchange students will benefit not only from first class teaching but will also enjoy the beautiful campus at Crawley and its multi-cultural community which includes students from 90 different countries.

Is pre-registration (enrolment) available? If not when does registration take place?

Pre-enrolment is not available at UWA, however classes do not normally fill up. Students may request pre-approval of units by completing a **Proposed Study List** in the online application. If required, an Academic Advisor will assess the proposed study plan for pre-requisites and other restrictions. An **Approved Study List** will then be emailed to the students prior to departure.

Formal enrolment takes place during Orientation. Students can seek academic advice during Orientation, and are able to receive additional approvals at this time. The add/drop period is open for the first 3 weeks of classes.

Language of instruction

The language of instruction is English.

Level

Undergraduate & Postgraduate (for exchange students can depend on terms of the agreement)

Duration

Minimum: 1 Semester or trimester Maximum: 2 Semesters or 3 trimesters

Restricted programs or courses (not open to study abroad / exchange students)

This depends on terms of the agreement. If the Agreement is Faculty-based, students may only be exchanged within the relevant faculties as specified within the terms of the Agreement. If the Agreement is a University to University Agreement, students may be exchanged within all faculties. Students may apply for any unit which is part of a standard course of study except for courses within the **Faculty of Medicine and Dentistry**.

Other courses may be restricted and some units may also be quota restricted.

Academic Requirements

Undergraduate Students: Completion of one year of tertiary study at a recognised institution at the time of application, with an overall weighted average equivalent to 65% on the UWA Grading Scale (normally a B grade or 3.0 on a 4 point GPA scale). Agreed equivalent is outlined within the Exchange Agreement.

Postgraduate students: Completion of a Bachelor's degree (or equivalent) in order to take classes at a postgraduate level.

Access to MBA classes requires the completion of a Bachelor's degree and 2 years minimum Management experience (or equivalent work experience).

All students must satisfy UWA's standard English language competency requirements. See below.

English Proficiency

TOEFL: Essay Rating/TWE of 4.5 and either 230 (Computer-based) or 570 (Paper-based)

TOEFL iBT: 90 with a minimum score of 22 in the Writing section and no less than 20 in the other sections.

IELTS: overall score of 6.5 with no individual component less than 6.0

Please note that some faculties may request higher scores.

Other English language qualifications not listed above will be assessed on an individual basis.

Alternative English Language Pathway (Exchange and Approved Study Abroad Partners only)

UWA offers two English language credit bearing units – English Language and Academic Communication (HUMA 1901 and HUMA1902), which will focus on English language and academic communication skills for tertiary study. These units have been designed to meet the immediate needs of Study Abroad and Exchange students entering the UWA for linguistic and cultural immersion. The units offer eligible students guided English language development within their program of study. Each unit has a value of one quarter (6 points) of a normal semester load (24points). The units may be studied concurrently, as independent units or as sequential units.

Students who take these units as part of their study program, may be admitted with the following English qualifications:

IELTS 6.0 (no band score below 6.0)
Internet-based TOEFL 77
Computer-based TOEFL 210
Paper-based TOEFL 540
Cambridge Certificate in Advanced English with C grade
UWA Bridging Course: C+ grade

Provided that students meet the academic requirements for entry, students applying for entry as Study Abroad or Exchange will be issued with a Letter of Offer conditional upon the results of the English Language Bridging course.

Application Process

Application deadlines

Semester 1 (Feb-June): Nominations by 30 November, Documents due by 31 December

Semester 2: (July-November): Nominations by 1 April, Documents due by 1 May

Late applications will be considered if there is enough processing time available.

How to nominate your students

Exchange/Study Abroad partners are required to nominate to UWA first, and then students will receive an email with password and instructions for completing the online application

To nominate a student, please email the following details to the Advisor for your region:-

Supporting documents required to be submitted with exchange application

- Most recent Academic transcript
- Application Coversheet (printed from online application and signed)
- Proposed Study Plan (printed from online application if applicable)
- Evidence of English Language Competency (if applicable)

In some cases, if the GPA falls marginally below the minimum required, we will also request:-

- 2 x academic references
- 1 x statement of motivation
- 1 x letter of support from home university / international office

Arrival / Orientation program

Recommended arrival dates

Your students should arrive a day or two before Orientation if housing has already been pre-arranged. Students who have not secured any housing are recommended to arrive at least two weeks prior to the commencement of classes.



Airport Pick-Up

A 24 hour airport pick-up service is available free of charge if you have applied for permanent or temporary housing in one of the University Residential Colleges, or if your final destination on arrival is within the university precinct (Nedlands, Crawley, Subiaco, Shenton Park or the Perth CBD).

Not applicable, however optional excursions will incur a small fee.

Accommodation

Is university-administered accommodation available to exchange students?

Is accommodation guaranteed for exchange students?

No. Applications are on a "first come, first served" basis, so it is important to apply early.

Students do not need to have received an offer letter before they can apply for housing

Accommodation Application Process

Refer to the website of each individual Residential College. Students usually send their housing applications directly to the residential college; however, if they are included with the exchange application, we will forward it to the college requested.

If university-administered accommodation is not available, will there be any assistance in finding private housing?

Students will be directed to the Housing Service of Student Services. The Housing Service offers a free and confidential accommodation advisory support service to enrolled students. Housing Officers do not arrange accommodation students but can only provide advice and information and manage the Housing Database, which is a self serve facility allowing enrolled students to view property listings and make their selections accordingly. A number of properties (either on a vacant or share basis) and rooms available for rent in homes in surrounding areas are listed in the Housing Database. Students may then access the information and contact owners or leasers directly to arrange a viewing.

Visa requirements

Are students required to obtain a student visa?

Yes. Once students' return the signed acceptance contract with applicable payment, UWA will issue a Confirmation of Enrolment document with will allow students to apply for an Australian Student Visa (ASV). UWA is an eligible institution for Streamlined Visa Processing. See http://www.immi.gov.au/students/



Are students allowed to work?

Students on an ASV can work up to 40 hours per fortnight during semester and unlimited hours during university holidays.

Working Holiday Visa (WHV)

If students come to UWA on a WHV they should be aware of the following -

- Students are not entitled to Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)but must accept the responsibility to arrange
 their own health insurance and acknowledge that they must cover their own expenses while in Australia
- Students will not be covered by the Education for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act which protects the interests of

Medical Insurance

Students from Sweden (covered by CSN), Norway and Belgium do not have to purchase the additional insurance. New-Zealand and Australian citizens will be eligible for Medicare and do not require OSHC.

Are students able to apply for an insurance waiver if they have their own insurance coverage?

No. OSHC is an Australian Government requirement.
