Objectives and Issues of the Conference

1 years after entry into force of the Directive 2005/29/EC, concerning unfair business-to-consumer commercial practices in the internal market, the impact of the respective implementation provisions on private law of EU Member States still remains unclear.

As the aforementioned directive 'is without prejudice to contract law and, in particular, to the rules on the validity, formation or effect of a contract' (Art 3, para 2) and 'without prejudice to individual actions brought by those who have been harmed by an unfair commercial practice' (Recital No 9), EU Member States were therefore not obliged, in order to implement the directive, to modify national contract and tort law rules and especially to introduce special private law remedies for the breach of the prohibition of unfair commercial practices.

Nevertheless by implementing the directive several national legislators spontaneously introduced ad hoc provisions, expressly conferring special contract and/or tort law remedies to consumers harmed by unfair commercial practices.

On the other side, in EU Member States whose legislators didn't adopt such a solution, it is discussed, whether and under which conditions the violation of the prohibition of unfair commercial practices can – by applying general principles of private law – affect the validity and the effectiveness of contracts concluded by consumers and/or can be qualified as a tort.

As a consequence deep differences have arisen among the EU national systems, so that the crucial question concerning the relationship between provisions on unfair commercial practices, contract and tort law as well as competition law is far away from coming to a clear, coherent and satisfying result.

Indeed, despite the full harmonisation of the criteria and parameters provided in order to qualify a commercial practice as unfair, the consequences arising from the violation of the relative provisions remain deeply fragmented in the different EU Member States.

Does that mean a total or – at least – partial failure of the harmonization task of the Directive on unfair commercial practices? The main purpose of the conference is therefore to outline the overall framework of the EU Member States' provisions and thereafter to give an answer, from the perspective of the EU Member States, to the following crucial question: would it be appropriate and/or necessary to provide a (real) full harmonisation also of private law consequences arising from the violation of the prohibition of unfair commercial practices?
